
Grammar

Review the following grammar lessons on apostrophes and quotation marks: Lessons 2, 3, 4, 9, 13, 25, 26, and 30. Here is a checklist for you:

- Know what an apostrophe looks like.
- Know that an apostrophe means *belonging to* or *of the*. The is John's book means the book belongs to John.
- Know how to use an apostrophe with plural nouns: The students' papers were graded.
- Know that pronouns use apostrophes for contractions, but *never* to show possession. In the following sentences, the pronouns are put in italics.
 - * The dog chased *its* tail.
 - * John ate *his* lunch.
 - * He's coming (He is coming.)
 - * They're kind. (They are kind.)
- Know the three ways to put punctuation with quotation marks in a sentence:
 1. Quotation at the beginning: "Not me!" he said or "Not me," he said or "Not me?" he asked.
 2. Quotation in the middle: "If he comes," she said, "give him this."
 3. Quotation at the end: He said, "Not me."
